Dear Parents and Carers,

I nipped outside yesterday to find a member of staff to ask them a question but found myself mesmerised by everything that was taking place around our school grounds. Station class were enjoying their daily mile, Miners were in their 'Wild Woods' area exploring through play, Ironbridge were in the middle of a very muddy Forest School session whilst Wrekin were enjoying their PE lesson doing football. There was still enough space for other classes to be outside doing something! I really have to pinch myself when I look at all of the space that we are afforded to use for learning outside.

On the topic of outdoor learning, I showed the children in Monday's assembly, the vase FILLED with their conker entries this year. I truly appreciate every child's entering and hope the process of finding one was a fun outdoor walk and explore for you all! The 3rd and 2nd place were split by just I gram, whilst the winning conker was a STONKER at 37 grams:


Bikeability for our Year 6 children is starting next month and we will be asking whether the Bikeability team are able to talk to children in other year groups about the importance of wearing helmets.

Budgeting for Christmas - Family Information

Service

Is it too early to mention the C word? We know Christmas can be a really expensive time of year so here are our top tips for keeping the costs down.

Are you receiving everything you are entitled to? Turn2Us is a charity who believes everyone in the UK should have financial security so they can thrive. They offer a free benefits calculator and grants search on their website. It only takes a few minutes to check if you are missing out on something you could be entitled to. https://www.turn2us.org.uk/

- Credit unions are not-for-profit organisations that provide savings, loans and a range of services to
 their members. There are two Credit Unions in Shropshire, <u>Fair Share Credit Union</u> and <u>Just Credit</u>
 <u>Union</u> Both offer Christmas loans to help you pay for this year and then save towards next Christmas.
- You can get support with housing, energy and food costs through Shropshire Council's Cost of Living website. You can be referred to the foodbank by a professional who knows you, such as your housing association, GP, support worker or school. They can also refer you for a Christmas Food and Gift Hamper and schemes such as Santa's Little Stars who provide wrapped age-appropriate Christmas presents to children all over the county.
- Our Family Information Directory will have lots of free or low cost activities and events to make
 Christmas fun. We are beginning to add events now and normally have over 100 listings by December.

The children are all enjoying our OPAL playground project and to ensure this continues we need some donations of loose parts. We continue to collect items for children to play with all year round and are asking for your help. The items we are looking for will enable us to enjoy a wider range of play experiences during playtime (see below for some examples):

- Anything on wheels/castors
- Plastic milk crates/supermarket delivery crates/plastic bread trays
 - Briefcases, especially hard cased ones
 - Cardboard boxes bigger the better
 - Ton builders bags
 - Road signs and cones
 - Tools like small spades/shovels, trowels and brooms
